Why did you decide to study in Japan?




What are good things you experienced after entering Hosei University?

- Students do not need a guarantor to rent an apartment. Apartment rentals in Japan generally require guarantors, which is a major obstacle for international students in Japan for the first time. Therefore, in an effort to eliminate the concerns of international students, Hosei University introduces companies that offer quarantor services. Moreover, international students are required to complete foreign resident registration procedures and take out national health insurance at a municipal office. Please rest
- assured that the staff members of Hosei University will explain how to complete

these procedures in detail.

• Full support for immigration procedures You do not have to worry about the visa since Hosei University sends an admission permit and an application form for the Certificate of Eligibility to each international student who has completed the admission procedures. After receiving these forms, simply fill out the form and send it back to the University. Hosei University will apply for the Certificate of Eligibility to the Immigration Bureau on your behalf. The Certificate of Eligibility will be sent to the University one to two months after submission of the application. After receiving the Certificate, the University will send it to you. Once you receive this Certificate, go to the Japanese embassy or consulate with your passport, admission permit, and the Certificate of Eligibility and apply for the visa.

Tuition and Scholarships

Hosei University has a tuition exemption system for self-supporting international students. Any student who meets the conditions of the system can obtain a 30% tuition discount. Moreover, a variety of scholarships are available for international students, including the Hosei International Fund (HIF) International Student Scholarship (up to 1 million yen per year). At Hosei University, about 80% of students use a scholarship of some kind.
